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



**Ukreate Hub** was created by Open Lithuania Foundation to support displaced Ukrainians, of whom majority are women.

Within the last 2 years Ukreate Hub has built a community of 350 active Ukrainians and has developed programmes that support their professional development and civic engagement, while contributing to their smoother integration in Lithuania.





### **DEMOGRAPHICS**

#### **UKRAINIAN REFUGEES ORIGINS BY OBLAST**





Each shaded region represents the specific Oblast from which these households have been displaced.

Majority of Ukrainian refugees in Lithuania Originate from Oblast Kharkiv (13,5%), Oblast Dnipropetrovsk (11,3%), Oblast Donetsk (9,9%), Oblast Kherson (9,1%) and Kiev (7,4%).

#### **Ukrainians in Lithuania**

- ~60-76 000 Ukrainians (refugees, temporary protection, others)
- + 200 new arrivals per week

55,8% of them are at the age 18-65 years old of them 75,5% are women

81% have higher education

over 40% officially employed

21-37% have no intentions to return to Ukraine

#### PROBLEM I

UKR women struggle to professionally integrate\*

- ✓ Ukrainian women of 30-49 years old are the biggest group of unemployed Ukrainians in Lithuania.
- Many displaced Ukrainian women report that they had to take employment lower than their qualifications (in Lithuania only 8% of Ukrainians work highly qualified jobs, 25% work unqualified or low qualification jobs).
- ✔ Professional integration barriers include: care obligations, limited knowledge of the local language, skills mismatches, difficulties in skills recognition, risk of exploitation, breakdown of family units, and uncertainties about the length of stay

### IMPACT OF POOR INTEGRATION

Failure to successfully integrate into labour market of host country has this impact on Ukrainian women:

- Inadequate income to satisfy individual and family financial needs.
- Loss of professional identity.
- Additional psychological burden.

#### **PROBLEM II**

There could be as many as **10 000** unemployed Ukrainian women in Vilnius\*

#### Programme participant is

- ✓ A Ukrainian women of 30-49 years old (66%)
- Resides in a city (Vilnius or other major city)
- ✓ Most likely is alone with one or two kids (41%)
- ✓ Is unemployed (33%) or self employed but not operating profitable business (39,2%)
- ✓ Strong motivation for financial stability (64,7%)

#### SPECIFIC PROBLEMS



#### Access to financing / seed funding\*\* -

from 90 Ukrainian businesses only 1 has received funding from state programme.

Access to relevant business networks and female role models – half of surveyed women said they don't know any other female entrepreneur.

Lack of knowledge on business development, both more general (how to develop a business plan) and local context (legal business forms, taxation, business culture & rules in Lithuania).

#### **Our Solution**

## UNIQUE VALUE PROPOSITION TO UKRAINIAN WOMEN

- Most of content is provided in Ukrainian language;
- ✓ Mentorship by female role models from Lithuanian business community;
- Designed for mothers with kids (Childcare provided during trainings and events);
- Being part of a growing and vibrant community;
- ✓ Hybrid programme accessible for Ukrainian women from regions
- Access to seed funding.

4 months-long comprehensive educational & mentorship programme for displaced Ukrainian women in Lithuania, designed to enable women to start their own business or further develop currently owned small businesses.



#### Some reflections

- ✓ Employment first approach does not necessarily guarantee long-term better integration into labour market
- ✓ Entrepreneurship promotion oriented programmes single out STEM or IT sector
- ✓ Understanding the specific challenges faced by particular migrant group (women) is essential in designing impactful interventions
- ✓ Training alone without access to seed funding/capital is likely to produce minimal results
- ✓ High motivation of public institutions and politicians can have long term positive spill-over effects for larger migrant community
